Activity Based Action Taken

1.1.1. Lecture method only Response: Lecture method also used.

In Government Degree College Shillai, the lecture method of teaching continues to play a significant and practical role as one of the most widely used instructional approaches, particularly in view of institutional realities and student strength. It is effectively employed for introducing new topics, explaining complex concepts through examples and analogies, summarizing study material, and sharing updated information that may not be readily available in textbooks. The method is especially useful in subjects such as History and Political Science, where large class sizes necessitate structured and time-efficient knowledge delivery. Despite the growing availability of online learning resources, the relevance of face-to-face lectures remains vital for conceptual clarity and academic guidance. However, the predominant use of the lecture method in the college is also influenced by limited ICT-enabled classrooms and inadequate digital infrastructure. Recognizing its limitations, the college encourages faculty members to supplement lectures with participatory, experiential, and problem-solving teaching methods wherever feasible to enhance student engagement and learning outcomes.

1.1 Mode of teaching

1.1.2 "Technology based teaching only or Blended teaching

Response: Technology based teaching is also used. Therefore, the method actually used is Blended Teaching government Degree College Shillai follows a **blended mode of teaching**, integrating the traditional lecture method with technology-based teaching to enhance the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process. While face-to-face classroom interaction remains central, teachers supplement instruction with ICT-enabled tools and digital resources to promote student engagement, higher-order thinking, and better knowledge retention. The college keeps pace with evolving educational technologies by encouraging faculty to participate in ICT-based faculty development programmes and online courses. As a result, faculty members have strengthened their communication and curriculum delivery skills and actively develop and use e-resources, thereby enriching the overall learning experience

1.1.3. Flipped Classroom

Government Degree College Shillai has made efforts to adopt the **flipped classroom approach** by encouraging students to engage with learning materials such as videos, reading resources, and presentations before class, while utilizing classroom time for discussions, problem-solving, and guided activities. However, the effective implementation of this method is constrained by the digital divide among the rural student population, low pre-class engagement by some students, and the time-intensive nature of creating quality pre-class content amidst faculty workload. Despite these challenges, teachers continue to explore flipped teaching practices, and greater governmental support in terms of digital inclusion, improved ICT facilities, and adequate staffing is essential for its successful and sustainable implementation.

1.1.4. As per need of different groups of students

Response: Yes

Government Degree College Shillai has developed a structured mechanism to address the diverse learning levels of its heterogeneous student population by identifying advanced and slow learners through continuous assessment. Departments conduct bridge courses at the beginning of academic programmes to strengthen foundational knowledge, especially for first-year students, while remedial classes are organized beyond regular hours to support slow learners through personalized attention without creating any sense of inferiority. Simultaneously, advanced learners are encouraged through seminars, presentations, and enrichment activities to accelerate their academic growth and creativity. In addition, meritorious students are supported through the distribution of laptops under the *SrinivasRamanujan Student Digital Yojana* of the Government of Himachal Pradesh, thereby promoting digital learning and academic excellence.

On 28 September 2024 (Saturday), the Botany Department of Government College Shillai organized an educational tour for B.Sc. Medical students to the Mushroom Farm at KandoBhatnol under the guidance of Assistant Professor Ms. SujataKhanna. The visit aimed to provide practical exposure to mushroom cultivation as part of the Skill Development curriculum. Students learned about different edible mushroom varieties, substrate preparation, spawning, environmental requirements, and harvesting techniques. Experts demonstrated scientific and sustainable cultivation methods, helping

studentslink theoretical knowledge with practical application. The visit also highlighted the nutritional, medicinal, and economic importance of mushroom farming as a potential self-employment opportunity. Overall, the tour was informative and interactive, enhancing applied botanical knowledge and promoting experiential learning and skill development among students.

- (2) Report on Educational Field Visit to ChandpurDhar (GC Shillai): On 23rd February 2025, the Department of Botany, Government College Shillai, in collaboration with the NSS Unit, organized an educational field visit to ChandpurDhar. The visit aimed to provide students with practical exposure to plant diversity, ecological interactions, and basic field study techniques. During the tour, students observed diverse plant species across different habitats and altitudinal zones. Faculty members assisted students in plant identification and explained their morphological, ecological, and medicinal significance. Students were also introduced to field sampling, documentation methods, and the importance of biodiversity conservation. The activity enhanced students' observational and analytical skills and created awareness about the conservation and sustainable use of plant resources. - 3. Ten students of **Government College Shillai** participated in the "**Kamal Ka Camp**", organized by the **Pratham Foundation** (**NGO**). The objective of the camp was to collect data on the **status of education** in the region. Before fieldwork, the students were provided with proper training on data collection methods and survey procedures. After the training, they were assigned to collect educational data from nearby schools in the region. Special provisions, including retests, alternative assessment modes, and resubmission of assignments, are extended to students participating in sports, NSS, and cultural activities or facing genuine constraints, thereby promoting fairness, flexibility, and continuous learning.

The first programme under this initiative, organised by IQAC on 27 November 2024 and led by Mr. Anil Sharma, Managing Director, Planet Education Society, focused on **Financial Literacy and Entrepreneurship**. The programme equipped students with basic knowledge of financial management, start-up planning, identification of local business opportunities, and skill-based career options.

Further, IQAC aligned its initiatives with the **Raising and Accelerating MSME Performance (RAMP) Programme** of the Ministry of MSME, Government of India, by facilitating the First District-Level Sensitisation Workshop at the Pre-Rural Incubation Centre in collaboration with the Himachal Pradesh Centre for Entrepreneurship Development (HPCED). The workshop aimed to create awareness about MSME schemes and entrepreneurial opportunities among students and local youth.

Building on these efforts, the IQAC-led Pre-Incubation Centre, with support from HPCED and the Incubation & Collaboration Unit (ICU), organised additional sensitisation and entrepreneurship development programmes to promote financial literacy, innovation, digital skills, and an entrepreneurial mindset in the rural region of District Sirmaur.

In addition, IQAC, in collaboration with **The Art of Living Foundation**, organised a seven-day wellness programme to promote stress management, mental well-being, and personal development among students, contributing to their overall academic and emotional growth.

To promote cultural awareness and preserve regional heritage, the IQAC, Government Degree College Shillai, organised a three-day workshop on "Sirmori Folk Dance: Rasa, Mujra, and Harul" in collaboration with the Himalayan Jan KalyanSanskritiManch, with sponsorship from the Department of Language and Culture, Shimla (Government of Himachal Pradesh). As a fully government-owned institution under the Department of Higher Education, Himachal Pradesh, the college receives budgetary support from the State Government, grants from UGC and RUSA, and contributions from stakeholders such as the PTA and Alumni Association. All expenditures and procurements follow the Himachal Pradesh Financial Rules (HPFR), 2009, with utmost care to ensure funds are used for their intended purposes. Statutory audits of salaries, reimbursements, and other government funds disbursed through Himkosh are conducted by the Indian Audit and Accounts Department, Principal Accountant General (Audit), Himachal Pradesh, while the Local Audit Department (LAD), Ministry of Finance, Government of Himachal Pradesh, audits various college funds. In addition, annual external audits by independent Chartered Accountants cover general and project-specific grants including RUSA, UGC, and NSS. Internal financial audits are conducted separate cashbooks and account books, verified personally by the Principal to ensure accuracy. Annual internal physical audits, including stock verification of assets, are performed by committees comprising staff from departments other than those being audited. The college has a history of compliance, with the last AG audit conducted in 2015 and all audit objections subsequently settled. This

Government Degree College Shillai, through its NSS Units I and II, organized a series of impactful plantation drives during August–September 2024 under the campaigns "EkPedMaaKeNaam" and Plantation Drive 2.0 as part of its extension and environmental sustainability initiatives.
